

JUVENILE JUSTICE AND DELINQUENCY PREVENTION COMMISSION

The following is a summary of the current members of the Sacramento County Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Commission.

Jane M. Claar

(Term Expires November 2014)

Ms. Claar was appointed to the Commission in November 2006. She is a Child Welfare Attendance Program Specialist for the Rio Linda Union School District. She represents the Rio Linda District at AB922 meetings, Schools Advisory Meetings, Children's Service Differential Response and Sacramento County SARB. She has coordinated the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act Grants from 2002-2007, as well as the School Community Policing Partnership Grant for 2004-2007. She was Chair of the Rio Linda District School Attendance Review Board Hearings with county agencies, where she planned and implemented *Project CHOICES* behavior prevention program with the Sacramento County Probation Department. Ms. Claar supervises district school community liaisons and site child welfare attendance assistants; and works with all district staff to increase district-wide attendance and decrease suspensions. She coordinates referrals to the Kops-n-Kids summer program. Ms. Claar completed the White House Counseling Center and Dyer-Kelly Elementary School internships through the San Juan Unified School District, the Woodland Community Counseling Center internship through the Woodland Unified School District and the California Middle School internship through Sacramento City Unified School District. She is a member of the California Association Supervisors Child Welfare Attendance and was President of the Delta-Sierra Section from 2006-2007. She is a member of the Association Supervision Curriculum Development, American School Counselor Association and the California Association Counseling Department. She currently volunteers for the Folsom Neighborhood Accountability Board, and has volunteered for the Folsom High Parent-Teacher Association; site council for the Folsom Hills and Folsom Middle School; the Folsom Hills Fox Club After-School Enrichment program, and was the assistant coach for the Folsom Junior Bulldogs Cheer Team. She received the "Volunteer of Year" award for the Folsom Middle School for co-directing spelling project for students' grade 6-8 in 1997, and the "Thank You" award from Gold Oak Elementary, El Dorado County SELPA in 1998.

Carole D'Elia

(Term Expires December 2014)

Ms. D'Elia was appointed to the Commission on December 14, 2010. Ms. D'Elia currently serves as deputy executive director for the Little Hoover Commission (LHC), an independent California government oversight agency charged with improving economy and efficiency in government. Prior to her appointment as deputy executive director, she served as project manager and research analyst. In her nine years with the LHC, Ms. D'Elia has led and participated on more than 16 projects assessing various policy areas including public safety, education, water, state and local government relations and health and human services. In 2008, she served as project manager for the LHC review of juvenile justice policies and in 2007 she led the LHC's assessment of corrections and sentencing policies. She has worked as a journalist for Valley Community Newspapers and Capitol Weekly, Inc.; established and managed a local monthly travel publication; and worked nearly a decade in the computer industry in market research and marketing communications. Ms. D'Elia holds a bachelor's of science degree in journalism from the University of Florida.

Dennis Dulay

(Term Expires May 2014)

Mr. Dulay was appointed to the Commission on February 3, 2003. He has 30 years of experience with the California Youth Authority, both in institutions and parole services. He has served as manager and Board of Directors 6th District American Legion Baseball, a member of the Steering Committee Safe Schools Task Force San Juan School District, and Board of Directors for CPPCA. He served as Chair to the Sacramento County Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Commission for the fiscal years 2005-2006 and 2006-2007.

Jerry Flynn

(Term Expires October 2012)

Mr. Flynn was appointed to the Commission on October 12, 2004. He retired from the Sacramento County Probation Department after 32-1/2 years of service. Assignments as a deputy probation officer included: Juvenile Institutions, Juvenile Court Investigations, Adult and Juvenile Field Supervision, Adult Intensive Supervision, Juvenile Court Presenter, Placement and Intake Booking. He served as a wing supervisor at the Juvenile Hall responsible for overseeing the programming and staffing of four of the eight living units, and developed an 80-hour staff-training program. Served on the Board of Corrections Committee to revise standards for juvenile detention facilities in California; was assigned as supervisor of the Placement Unit, supervising deputies placing juvenile wards throughout the State of California and three out-of state placement facilities. Subsequently, assigned as the supervisor of the Sacramento County Quality Assurance and Technical Assistance Group Home Unit, responsible for evaluating local placements, encouraging more available beds for Sacramento County wards and dependent children. Also, monitored a contract with two local placements whose 131 beds were dedicated solely to Sacramento County. Past chairman of the Northern California Placement Committee (NCPC). Currently, employed as a retired annuitant, supervising the group home unit and facilitating the Interagency Management and Authorization Committee (IMAC).

Ronald W. Hayes

(Term Expires August 2013)

Mr. Hayes was appointed to the Commission on August 22, 2004. He has 30 years of work experience with the California Youth Authority as a parole agent, classification program specialist, delinquency prevention consultant, administrative assistant to the Deputy Director, regional administrator, deputy director-Prevention and Community Corrections Branch, and deputy director-Parole Services Branch. He worked as a deputy probation officer in both Butte and Plumas Counties. He was a member of the Plumas County Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Commission for three years, serving as Chair from 1998-1999, and served as past president of the CPPCA.

Allan H. Lammers

(Term Expires October 2012)

Mr. Lammers was appointed to the Commission on October 12, 2004, and served as Chair from June 2007–June 2009. He has worked with the California Board of Corrections since 1996 and participated in administering a variety of statewide juvenile crime prevention programs. Over the past fourteen years, he has served as a board member to Community Connection, which provides assistance for ex-offenders; the Children's Media Forum, Friends of Light Rail, Sacramento Camellia Festival, president of the River View Homeowner's Association, co-chair to Downtown Partnership Economic Development Task Force, Sacramento Small Business Roundtable, Sacramento Jazz Jubilee Business Advisory Council, and the California Cultural Assembly. Mr. Lammers also served as executive officer for the State Council on Mentally Ill Offenders (COMIO) from 2006-2009. He is now retired.

William Lane

(Term Expires March 2013)

Dr. Lane was appointed to the Commission on March 9, 2009. He has an extensive background working with incarcerated and formerly incarcerated adults and juveniles for the past 25 years. He has an Associate of Arts Degree in Business Administration, a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Interdisciplinary Studies, a Master of Science Degree in Educational Administration and a Doctorate of Philosophy in Educational Administration, with an emphasis in high-risk youth education and criminal delinquency. While teaching at the California Youth Authority from 1990-1995, he wrote curriculum, provided staff development and designed the educational component for Leadership, Esteem, Accountability and Discipline program at the Preston School of Industry. In 1995, he transferred to San Quentin State Prison and became the head of education in charge of adult academic programs, vocational programs, athletic programs, recreational and law libraries and all educational programming on condemned row. During this time he developed the only fully accredited Associates of Arts college degree program in any California State Prison, which was totally run by volunteers. He has worked as a consultant for school districts, county offices of education, and juvenile justice programs throughout California for high-risk youth education, in addition to working extensively with local education agencies on collaborating with Probation and Community Based Organizations to develop the highest quality of educational services possible. Dr. Lane has developed training around the Intensive Aftercare Program (IAP) model, specifically on the Performance Based Standards for Transition and is currently serving as administrator for the Sacramento Community Based Coalition (SCBC) – a transition program for adults being paroled to Sacramento from State prison.

Ann Longmore

(Term Expires September 2011)

Ms. Longmore was appointed to the Commission on November 7, 2000. She has 20 years of experience researching, designing and establishing action line programs for more than 30 television network affiliates. She has served children in the Sacramento Community through the Child Placement Committee of the Sacramento County Children's Commission, volunteered at the Morgan Alternative Center, as an on-call probation assistant with the Sacramento County Neighborhood Alternative Center, and as a founding board member of the Sacramento County Child Advocates.

Heyman Matlock, Jr.

(Term Expires June 2014)

Mr. Matlock was appointed to the Commission on June 3, 2008. He has 25 years of service with the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation Youth Division, and 17 years experience in management/supervisory capacity working in positions as student services; youth authority administrator (superintendent and assistant superintendent); principal; vice-principal; institutional parole agent; juvenile justice recruiter and high school teacher. He has experience in three branches of the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, institutions & camps, education and administrative services. He is currently the coordinator of student services at the Natomas Unified School District and has served as assistant superintendent at the O.H. Close Youth Correctional Facility in Stockton, CA; acting superintendent (April 2005 – October 2005) and assistant superintendent (April 2001 – April 2004) at Preston Youth Correctional Facility in Ione, CA; and youth authority administrator at Central Office Institutions & Camps Branch. His educational achievements include Master of Arts, Administrative Education, National University 1990; Bachelor of Arts, Political Science, CSU Sacramento 1979; Education Administrative Credential and Secondary Education Teaching Credential. Mr. Matlock has been involved in community activities which include youth soccer and baseball coach; an elder at Faith Fellowship Community Church; member of the Sacramento Neighborhood Accountability Board; and mentor for elementary and middle school students.

Frederick Mills

(Term Expires October 2012)

Mr. Mills was appointed to the Commission on December 15, 2009. He is the president and principal consultant of Mills and Associates, since its inception in 1985, providing consultant services to a wide variety of local and state agencies, private companies, and as needed to the National Council on Crime and Delinquency from 2006-2008.. Mr. Mills has served on expert panels involved in the identification of deficiencies in the Safety and Welfare Plan prepared by the Division of Juvenile Justice, California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation; and has been involved in numerous projects ranging from The California Endowment's Mental Health Program, to assessing various counties for mental health readiness, as well as Santa Barbara's Reengineering Reentry Pilot Project. From October 1997 to December 2002, Mr. Mills was the principal contributing consultant to the National Council on Crime and Delinquency for implementation of the Federal Office Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention's Comprehensive Strategy for Serious, Violent and Chronic Juvenile Offenders, establishing a comprehensive, strategic continuum of prevention, intervention, and sanction services working with 52 sites in eight states. Mr. Mills has over 48 years of experience in the private and public sectors in human resources management and program development and implementation. He worked over 30 years in the correctional field for the State of California as deputy secretary of the Youth and Correctional Agency; deputy director of the California Youth Authority, deputy director of the Office of Criminal Justice Planning, assistant chief of Planning and Resource Development for the Youth Authority, and the principal state-wide trainer for the development, implementation and training for all Youth Authority peace officers on laws of arrest, search and seizure.

Daniel Okada

(Term Expires December 2012)

Dr. Okada was appointed to the Commission in December 2004. He is an assistant professor of Criminal Justice at Sacramento State University. Most recently, he professed and was department chair of criminal justice at Marist College in Poughkeepsie, New York. While at Marist he also served on several municipal and countywide task forces, committees, and organizations charged with planning, developing, and monitoring a range of criminal and juvenile justice activities. Dr Okada is a Vietnam veteran and holds a bachelor's degree in psychology from the University of California Berkeley, a master's in criminal justice from California State University Long Beach, and a doctorate in criminology from the University of Maryland. Dr. Parmely was appointed to the Commission on October 10, 2006. He has affiliations with organizations such as the Children's Protective Services Oversight Committee, the California Association of Services for Children, and the National Association for Family-Based Services.

Gwendolyn Jackson-Tucker

(Term Expires August 2013)

Ms. Jackson-Tucker was appointed to the Commission on August 22, 2004. She retired as YA Administrator in April 2005, after 31 years of work experience with the California Youth Authority providing training and treatment for youthful offenders throughout the state. While at CYA she worked as a youth counselor, senior youth counselor, treatment team supervisor, program administrator, institutions and camps manual coordinator, ADA coordinator, regulations coordinator, victims right's coordinator, AIDS education instructor, return-to-work coordinator, population management, Intake/Court services administrator. Other work experiences included undergraduate advisor at the University of Riverside, counselor at Patton State Hospital, and counselor for San Bernardino County Substance Abuse Program at Agape House.
